



From the Administrator's Desk

A colleague gave me the picture of the gigantic Angel Oak tree, its massive, ancient roots exposed. The quote read, "This was once just a seed, what are you planting?" This photograph humbled me as I consider the awesome work that happens at Johnstown Christian School. With over 200 young seeds in our walls every day, what lessons and truths are being planted daily?

The school's theme this year is "Rooted and Growing in Christ: Engaging Minds, Building Character, Deepening Faith." Our desire is to see students grow in all three areas while attending JCS. The JCS community looks at this as a privilege to provide "Christian families with a Christcentered education which prepares their children spiritually, academically, and socially to live for the glory of God. Students will be prepared spiritually in their commitment to Christ and their development of a Christian world and life view, academically with a quality curriculum, and socially through the development of Godly character traits" as it says in our mission statement.

To carry out our theme, we must engage students' minds. This means rigorous academics taught in

relevant ways. Our teaching staff seeks to incorporate the best teaching pedagogy to produce an excellent educational program. This is seen in the lives of our graduates who continue onto high education. To quote a 2013 graduate, "I was more than prepared for university and my future work place. My elementary, middle school, and high school teachers held me to a level of excellence in all areas that put me ahead of my peers in university. I was prepared for the higher level thinking, especially in writing and problem solving, that is necessary for anyone going on to higher education. In addition, I was equipped with the essential skills for the work place, a desire to do work well, the self-discipline to keep a schedule, and interpersonal skills." That is an engaged mind!

Secondly, we must build character. This is accomplished in many different avenues. We heard some of these avenues at our annual Fall Banquet from Josh and Sarah Varner, JCS alumni. Josh spoke passionately about how true godly character is developed in conjunction with our athletic program. While a soccer coach at JCS, he worked to develop much more that soccer skills alone. He mentored and guided

young athletes to see how their character is reflected on the soccer field. It encourages me to consider the many times in a student's school career that we can help to develop this character.

The last phrase of our theme, "deepening faith," points us to some of the defining distinctives about JCS and Christian education. It is an awesome responsibility to teach students math, reading, science, and history. However, we at JCS have the added responsibility of helping students to strengthen their spiritual roots. Jeremiah 17:7-8 states, "But blessed is the one who trusts in the Lord, whose confidence is in him. They will be like a tree planted by the water that sends out its roots by the stream. It does not fear when heat comes; its leaves are always green. It

comes; its leaves are always green. It has no worries in a year of drought and never fails to bear fruit." JCS's mission would not be complete if we did not guide students in the planting of roots. My humble prayer is that as JCS embarks on many more years of educating young people,

we would be in the business of engaging minds, building character, and deepening faith.

Alaska

Alaina Miller ('18) and Adrianna Thomas ('19) had the opportunity to participate in a week long trip in July with their church, Emmanuel, to Anchorage, Alaska. There they worked with local kids at a playground in the middle of a low-income neighborhood. In this area in particular, the majority of the population had somewhat recently immigrated to the US resulting in a lot of cultural diversity. The goal of the week was simply to show the kids that people care about them, and more importantly that God loves them and cares for them. Each day the team would play games, have time at the playground, assemble crafts, sing songs, and tell Bible stories with the kids. Anchorage has much brokenness due to parental drug and alcohol abuse and the effect is on their children.



"It was super powerful to see how God worked through us to cause transformation in these kids' lives throughout the week," Alaina commented. The team saw relationships growing each day. In the middle of the week, the team hosted a community park party for the families, and several kids accepted Jesus into their hearts. Families were thankful. Adrianna added, "Alaska was an incredible experience and blessing! It was truly beautiful to see how God worked in the hearts of the people there and our own team. The Lord is working in Anchorage, Alaska, and I am so humbled and blessed to play a small role in the work there."

Niagara Falls

This summer **Daniel ('20)** and **Mary Hostetter ('22)** went with their youth group on a missions trip to Niagara Falls.

Daniel served by beautifying a cemetery, working in a Salvation Army garden, and playing bingo with seniors at an area church. He enjoyed the cookout held for community members where he got to serve food to the attendees. Daniel developed a closer personal relationship with God on this trip and also was exposed to a different part of American culture.

Kyiv, Ukraine

This is the twelfth year that I have had the opportunity to serve at an English Camp in Kyiv, Ukraine. Our team was wonderfully diverse: 1 Aussie, 7 Americans, 4 Kiwis, and 1 Chinese/American. Throughout camp, we played games, had Bible discussions, watched a movie about the life of Christ, shared testimonies, sang worships songs, and clearly presented the Gospel.

God worked powerfully through the activities and the team to show Himself to the students.

One of the unique aspects of this year's camp was that none of my student partners were actually college students. Mary is getting her masters (and got married a few weeks before camp!); Natalia is starting a job teaching at a college (and got married in September!); and Ilona has an 8 year old son. They're all in their late twenties. Ilona is a Christian, and she partnered with me to reach out to the girls. Natalia was especially open and is very close to making a decision to follow Christ. Another unusual thing was that we had two brothers at camp who are refugees from Afghanistan. They have lived in Ukraine for about two years but don't know where the rest of their family is. They are



Shi'a (which is a persecuted/targeted minority in Sunnimajority Afghanistan), as well as being from an ethnic minority. They asked a lot of questions about Christianity, and Masih, the younger brother, was especially open about asking questions and sharing his beliefs. Another aspect that

differentiated this year's camp was **Sadie Sprankle** ('13). Sadie has been to camp for many years and served in Kyiv full-time, but this was her the last camp for the foreseeable future as she has followed God's leading to serve in Budapest, Hungary. Lastly, camp was very different for me as I have been recovering from a broken tibia. This made some aspects of camp a challenge, but it was a wonderful blessing to be able to serve in Kyiv again. I am grateful that God made a way for me to go and that He used me to impact the lives of Ukrainians.

Mongolia

This summer Aubrey Cook ('19) traveled for almost two days in order to get to the "end of the world," Mongolia, for two weeks. She and ten other people from Somerset Alliance Church served the missionaries and Mongolian people in various ways. The first week, they held an English camp for kids ages 8-20 in Darhan. They went over vocabulary, reading comprehension, American games and snacks, speaking, and crafts. Aubrey was able to share the Gospel with all of the kids using the wordless book and by doing a puppet show with another teammate. Comic Bibles and prizes such as a Gospel soccer ball were awarded. A



playground was outside of where the team was staying, and everyday after the camp, Aubrey loved connecting with the kids. At first the kids wanted nothing to do with her, but by the end of the week, they were almost inseparable and were together any chance they got. She says, "I felt like a celebrity, every time I would get out of the car they started yelling my name and the little boys would bring me flowers. One time I was in the building where we were staying and all of the kids came up to the window and started chanting my name until I came outside." The second week Aubrey served the full-time missionaries by taking care of their kids and teaching them multiple Bible lessons. The kids were able to have a fun time and got to experience lots of new things. Aubrey says, "God was really speaking to me. I will never forget that trip and the memories I made."

Kentucky
