



From the Administrator's Desk

"The waiting place...for people just waiting. Waiting for the fish to bite or waiting for wind to fly a kite or waiting around for Friday night. Everyone is just waiting." *Oh, the Places You'll Go!* by Dr. Seuss

Waiting is something we do quite a lot. Dr. Seuss speaks of it in his whimsical way, but it is not always very whimsical. Waiting can be anywhere from annoying to heartbreaking for people. There is a lot of waiting in this business of education. We are waiting to see learning: has third grade really mastered multiplication tables? Can the band play a piece the whole way through? Can a basketball play-

er properly execute a left-handed layup? We are waiting to see spiritual growth. Essentially, much of the growth we desire to see will take many years to fully happen. I often am reminded of cathedral builders in Europe. These master craftsmen would work on a building they wouldn't ever see completed in their lifetime. This is a lot like us as educators; we are building into students who will

not fully be "finished" in their time at JCS.

Waiting can be a great time of development for what God is preparing us to do. For our students that may mean learning academic, social, and spiritual lessons that will prepare them for the future. Today we had one of our all school chapels. Our speaker was Mrs. Carr; she just returned from a short-term mission trip to Kenya. It has been an exciting part of our school year, as she has purposefully worked to connect us to the mighty work happening in Kenya. As I think of preparation while waiting, isn't that what Mrs. Carr's students are experiencing? We pray that they too will eventually share in this type of a global ministry, but her fourth graders are not ready for that now. Sometimes our waiting is really preparation for what is to come. I appreciate

the role God has placed me in at JCS, but this has been a work in progress for many years before I even knew I was being prepared. How is God preparing you?

Waiting can be a time when we miss the blessings of today. In our waiting for students to fully show growth, I don't want us to miss the signs of change we see now. Can a student read 40 words per minute, while two weeks ago she only read 30? Or a student who is struggling to stay organized just had the most powerful spiritual application to this week's

memory verse. Maybe you are waiting for something in your life and don't see much progress. Don't forget to stop and look around, God may be placing little blessings all around you. However, sometimes in our focus on what we are waiting for we miss other important blessings happening now.

Waiting can also be a time when attitudes of the heart bubble to the surface. My children laugh about

my waiting in line for ice cream and saying "I am just trying to be happy here" with a most unhappy voice and scowl. In our waiting, have we allowed gratitude to seep in? Am I watching expectantly for something with a grateful heart? In Psalms 130:5-6, we are encouraged to wait with hope: "I wait for the Lord...in his word I hope."

Just as teachers wait, so did the people of God. Noah waited for a flood, slaves waited to be free, Israel waited for a savior. Sometimes, like those in the Bible, we don't even know what we are waiting for. When Abraham was asked to sacrifice Isaac, he was given a ram. This probably wasn't what he was looking for, but that ram changed the plan for Abraham and for Isaac. What is God sending to us that is exactly what we need, maybe not even what we were looking for.

Waiting is hard, I admit. But often in the waiting God has much to teach us. Just as the Psalmist states, we

will see His goodness, "I believe that I shall look upon the goodness of the LORD in the land of the living! Wait for the LORD; be strong, and let your heart take courage; wait for the LORD!" Psalm 27: 13-14. I can't wait to see what God will do next at JCS!



Anchorage, Alaska



Last June, Daniel Hostetter (*20) flew to Anchorage, Alaska, for a week with the Emmanuel Church youth group. Every afternoon, his ministry group spent time at a local park playing with children of all ages from the surround-

ing trailer parks. These kids were many different ethnicities (Asian, African-American, indigenous Alaskan) and from different financial and home situations. Daniel played countless games with the kids: football, soccer, four-square, tag, and mouse-onground (a favorite Alaskan playground game).

All of the members of the ministry team got the chance to lead a Bible lesson in the park for the kids, so Daniel acted out the story of Zacchaeus. He told the kids that Jesus wants to come into their house (just like in the story of Zacchaeus) and that God is a God of redemption and forgiveness. The kids seemed to quickly grasp the concept of how a bad person became a good person, but only through Christ.

One of Daniel's favorite parts of the week was being able to build personal relationships with the kids in the park. He connected with an 11 year old named TJ, who loved to play the ukulele. Daniel sat beside him for hours while he played and sang.

Daniel said, "It was heartwarming to see his talents blossom, but it was also heart-breaking to hear TJ pour out his feelings in song. TJ's dad left his family when he was young, and it was clear that TJ felt abandoned and unloved by his father." Daniel got to talk to TJ about how our heavenly Father will still love us even when our earthly relationships may fail.

On Tuesday night, the youth group team held a Park Party at the park. They grilled hot dogs for the community, painted the kids' faces and hair, and interacted with the families of the children. It was a great opportunity for Daniel and his ministry group to connect to the community as a whole. The park ministry allowed God to use Daniel and his group to invest in the lives of the kids. The organization Daniel served under, Graceworks Alaska, brings in other ministry groups all summer, and the local church and Graceworks partner to keep tabs on the kids throughout the year.

Anchorage has a very large homeless population, and it is commonplace to see them on the sidewalks. Daniel and his youth group went to the local Walmart and bought large quantities of personal care supplies. They bagged the supplies, along with a gospel tract and a list of homeless shelters, and delivered them to homeless people they encountered on the street.

Every now and then, Daniel and his group took breaks from ministry and explored Alaska. Whether they were hiking straight up a mountain above Anchorage, floating on a glacier cruise, staying up late on the summer solstice (the sun never went down!), seeing a moose and a bear, or having a glacial snowball fight, Daniel and his group constantly witnessed the awesome beauty of the Last Frontier.

After the trip, Daniel described his experience as "perspective-altering." He said that he "hopes that the seeds I helped to sow in the kids, especially TJ, will be eternal."

Lima, Peru

Megan Hodges ('20) returned to Lima, Peru,



in July with her brother **Zachary** ('17) and a group of people from her church, Greater Johnstown Christian Fellowship. While they were there, they served many children and families. They went out into the community and shared a Bible lesson with the children, passed out bread and hot chocolate, and gave them a treat bag with candy, soap, a toothbrush, and other necessities. The team also built a few houses for some families. Megan enjoyed playing with the children and forming relationships with everyone. She learned that you do not need material things to be happy.

While at the day home, Mary was able to connect with a lady who spoke only Spanish. Sarah played Canadian Poker and colored with some of the residents there, which taught her how important relationships can be in sharing your faith. Jacob realized that he must tell others the reason he is serving them if he wants to convey God's love and make an eternal impact on their lives through his service. Lydia Hostetter ('25) and Amelia Shaffer ('25) served at a children's club (Place of Promise). In their free time on the trip, Lydia and Amelia made friendship bracelets for every girl at the children's club. Amelia learned that many people do not have as much as she does and that something as simple as a bracelet can mean a lot to them. Lydia was able to connect with several of the children at the club and learned that getting to know someone can bring many opportunities to share her faith. All of these students would definitely recommend going on a mission trip because of the opportunities it gives you to grow spiritually and serve others, but also because it is a lot fun.

Nairobi, Kenya

After 8 years of supporting Erick Simba (director of Christian Best Camps of Kenya), God made it clear that Mrs. Marsha Carr was to travel to Nairobi to visit the camp and minister to the people. Marsha traveled November 4-18. "I was



blessed to be able to sit on the playground that JCS has helped to fund. I watched as the children came through the gates excited to have a safe place to play and create new friendships! That image will be etched in my heart and mind for ever! It was great to see that our fundraising, prayers, and efforts have a face and a purpose in the Kingdom." She spent several days in the slums of Mathare and Kibera visiting people in their homes, speaking with small groups, and praying with them. The newly built Community Resource Center needed a wall painted, so she headed up a group to create a personalized wall, adding a verse and painting the handprints of the children and staff at the center. "I learned that when people have a purpose and feel loved, they can be transformed into what God has called them to be."

Budapest, Hungary & Kyiv, Ukraine

This is the thirteenth year that **Miss Laura Courtney** has had the opportunity to serve at an English Camp in Kyiv, Ukraine. In addition to the usual camp, she was able to serve in Budapest, Hungary, with her friend **Sadie Sprankle** (**'13)**, who is in full-time ministry there.

At the camp in Hungary, the students were 11 -16 years old and had varying levels of English. In addition to games, discussions, and worship, Laura and Sadie taught several English lessons every day.
