

FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR'S DESK

This year's theme at Johnstown Christian School is "Walk Worthy," taken from Colossians 1:10:

"So as to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to Him; bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God."

We've spent a lot of time asking and pondering: What does it mean to walk worthy? It feels like this theme has stirred honest questions in our students, teachers, and families. How do we walk in a way that pleases Him, bears fruit, and grows in knowledge?

I am a runner, slow, but a runner nonetheless. The Lord often uses running to teach me spiritual lessons, and this season was no different. As I reflected on what it means to "Walk Worthy," here's what He showed me:

Intentionality

I love trail running. In the summer and on weekends, I can usually be found logging miles on one of our area's beautiful rails to trails. But this summer, I realized something: on those long, quiet runs, it was easy for my mind to drift. I would relax, enjoy the scenery, and simply meander along. As a slow runner, this meant I became even slower!

When I switched back to road running, my pace improved dramatically. Why? Because running on the road requires focus - cars, people, sidewalks, intersections. I had to be intentional. I had to pay attention.

Our walk with Christ is often the same. We may be "moving," but not with purpose or focus. We drift. We become distracted. To "Walk Worthy," we must walk with intentionality.

Accountability

I truly enjoy running alone, it gives me space to think, pray, and reflect. However, my favorite running partners are my daughters, all of whom are much faster than I am. It is amazing how much better I run when I am with them, talking and laughing as we cover miles. One day, my daughter, very pregnant at the time, was still pulling me along to a better pace!

Our "Walk Worthy" journey is similar. We can do it alone, but when we walk in community, we are strengthened, encouraged, and pulled forward.

Movement

In recent years, I've tried my hand at ultras. These races, usually on technical single-track trails, range from 30K to 100 miles. They are a whole new challenge. In ultras, the clock matters less - although there are cutoff times - but the primary goal is finishing. The terrain is difficult. The hours are long. The mindset shifts to simply keep moving forward and staying upright. Trust me... it's challenging. (Maybe even a little crazy!)

But doesn't this sometimes mirror our spiritual walk? There are seasons when life is difficult, exhausting, or overwhelming. In those moments, "walking worthy" may look like nothing more than putting one foot in front of the other - steady, faithful forward motion.

This year, I am praying that our students deepen their desire to "Walk Worthy." And with that, I am also deeply challenged to be faithful in my own walk. May we be a people who are pleasing to Him, bearing fruit, and growing in the knowledge of God.

Guatemala

Casa Shalom is a home for orphaned, abandoned, abused, and neglected boys and girls. Located in the beautiful mountains of Guatemala, Casa Shalom is a refuge and a safe haven for children from across the country. The home was opened in 1986 to care for orphans of Guatemala's 36-year-long civil war.

All children at Casa Shalom receive a nutritious diet, medical and dental care, Christ-centered therapy, education, and job-skills training. Most importantly, they're introduced to Jesus as their Lord and Savior and raised to be Christ-following, educated young men and women!

While serving at the orphanage, the church group did various tasks including painting, cleaning, and assembling and welding together large shelves to be used in the orphanage's new kitchen currently under construction. There was also plenty of time to play and hang out with the children and teens. Some of their favorite games included Uno, soccer, jumping rope, and piggyback rides. Even with the language barrier, meaningful connections were made with the children.

Steve loved seeing the kids' faces light up every time they saw them. He also enjoyed welding the shelves, which will have a long-lasting impact by improving the ease of storage for the kitchen staff.

Jenn's favorite part was seeing the joy in the kid's faces and playing jump rope. Traveling to an impoverished nation was a first for her and gave her a greater appreciation for all God has blessed her with. Also, the views of the surrounding mountains and volcanoes from the orphanage were quite amazing!

Blair's favorites were visiting the baby/toddler room and playing Uno and soccer with the children. Cameron also really enjoyed playing soccer with the boys. They both gained a greater appreciation for their home and family.

Cottage Ministries / Farmington, NM

Sarah Huston, a 2022 graduate, spent the summer of 2025 interning with Cottage Ministries, a young adult ministry based in Williamsport, PA. During her internship, Sarah led several Bible studies each week and participated in daily Bible discussions with her fellow interns.

One of the highlights of Sarah's internship was leading a mission trip to Farmington, New Mexico, from June 24 to July 2, 2025. The group worked alongside Higher Grounds Church and the Bielecki family, who have dedicated their lives to reaching the Navajo people through their ministry.

The Navajo people have a deeply spiritual culture, often turning to witch doctors, Skinwalkers, and nature gods for guidance. Their spiritual goal is to achieve balance in mind, body, and spirit. While the team heard many stories of spiritual encounters with the physical world, they were reminded throughout their trip that



the Lord has ultimate power over the enemy, and we can always call on Him in times of need.

Sarah and her team primarily worked with the Bielecki family, who had recently moved off the reservation after serving there for nine years. Originally from Wisconsin, the Bieleckis were called to the Navajo reservation, where they ministered to the community for nearly a decade. Now, through their Matthew 28 Ministries, they open their garage and offer free use of tools and equipment on Fridays to help locals work on their vehicles. In return, they share the gospel over lunch.

Over the course of the week, Sarah and her team painted the exterior of the Bieleckis' new property, including their garage and other buildings. They also

participated in "Open Shop" events where they built relationships with the local community while offering assistance with vehicle repairs.

Another group from Sarah's team worked on improving the facilities at Higher Grounds Church to accommodate its growing congregation.

Throughout the trip, Sarah was deeply encouraged by the Bielecki family's story—how God had led them to the reservation and how He continues to provide for them. Their faith was a powerful reminder of God's ongoing provision, and Sarah was encouraged to pray expectantly, trusting the Lord in all circumstances.

Christian Best Camps of Kenya

Marsha Carr is a retired Elementary teacher and current ASL teacher at JCS. She has been supporting Christian Best Camps of Kenya (CBCK) for more than 15 years. Mrs. Carr has been blessed to come alongside founder Eric Simba on this journey from its beginning.
